Results from Pulse Survey #2

UC Berkeley Student Experiences in Fall 2020 21 October 2020



As we continually adjust to the changes due to the COVID-19 pandemic, UC Berkeley is administering Pulse Surveys every few weeks to better understand and address student needs. During the 7th and 8th week of classes, all undergraduate (N = 30,799) and graduate students (N = 11,548) were invited to take the second Pulse Survey. The response rate was 47% (N = 14,413) for undergraduates and 34% (N = 14,413) for graduate students.




Student mental health

Pulse Survey #2 shows that there is cause for concern as students' mental health appears to have deteriorated from Pulse Survey #1, conducted four weeks before.



Work-Study for Undergraduates

Of undergraduates who may qualify for Work-Study (N = 10,548), 14% have a Work-Study position this term, 63% do not have a Work-Study position, and the remaining 22% don't know if they are eligible for Work-Study.



Students living near or on campus

Among students who took the survey (N = 18,173), 31% moved to be closer to campus this term and 32% permanently reside here, accounting for the 63% of students living in the Bay Area. A higher percentage of graduate students (73%) than undergraduates (60%) are living in the Bay Area.

63% of students are living in the Bay Area this term

Of these students who are in the Bay Area (N = 11,335), 30% plan to travel over Thanksgiving break and an additional 23% are unsure of whether they will travel.

52% of students living in the Bay Area may travel for Thanksgiving break

Of those not permanently living in the Bay Area and who may travel (N = 4,124), 66% plan to return and 22% are unsure of whether they will return.

88% of students who may travel might return to the Bay Area

Academic Calendar for Spring 2021

Two-thirds of undergraduates and over half of graduate students would prefer to keep spring recess and leave the Spring 2021 academic calendar unchanged.
